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### **EDUCATION POLICIES: SASKATCHEWAN**

The Rick Hansen Foundation School Program supports key Saskatchewan Education Priorities.

Caring and Respectful Schools provides the framework for strengthening schools as caring, respectful and safe learning environments. Curriculum and resources are developed to strengthen personal and social development and teach responsibility and caring for others. The aims of this policy align with the Rick Hansen Foundation School Program (RHFSP), which promotes and enhances students' capacity for positive school relationships, building community and increasing personal accountability. By teaching inclusion, awareness and social responsibility, RHFSP is an ideal tool to support a safe and caring school environment. The Ministry of Education has published **Learning Resource Evaluation Guidelines** to facilitate the selection and use of high-quality learning resources. RHFSP offers resources that align with these guidelines. The content is current, accurate, authentic, and includes significant Canadian content. Materials are fair, equitable, and supportive of each individual. Various types of resources are available, all of which are user-friendly, available at no cost to educators, and require no in-service before use.

The Government of Saskatchewan's **Plan for Growth** set a goal of making Saskatchewan the best place in Canada for people with disabilities. Priorities of the **Disability Strategy** include accessibility, education and support for community inclusion. RHFSP is designed to teach the importance of equity, inclusion, and social responsibility. This is essential to the creation of an equitable and inclusive education system where all students, including those with disabilities, can reach their potential.

RHFSP also supports the anti-bullying initiatives outlined in **Saskatchewan's Action Plan to Address Bullying and Cyberbullying**. RHFSP supports students' development of responsible behaviour. The activities and lessons engage youth in creating solutions to foster positive relationships, using materials that reflect these values. Activities help students understand that all people are valued for their unique skills, experiences and perspectives, and help them make personal and social connections.

The Ministry of Education's **Broad Areas of Learning** reflect the desired attributes for Saskatchewan's students. These include fostering **a sense of self, community and place**; becoming **lifelong learners**; and becoming **engaged citizens**. RHFSP aligns with these broad areas of learning by promoting healthy relationships and the appreciation of diversity, encouraging students to advocate for self and others, and empowering students to act as Difference Makers for the common good.
